NCUIH FACILITATES FIRST FEMA UIO LEADERS CALL

On May 29, for the first time, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) met exclusively with a group of Urban Indian Organization (UIO) leaders. The call took place via Zoom video conference.
