The Indigenous HIV/AIDS Syndemic Strategy: Weaving Together the National HIV, STI, and Viral Hepatitis Plans



Case Study 1:

UIO A is an Outreach & Referrals organization. Community members come to this UIO for traditional medicines and cultural practices, as well as referrals and recommendations to local clinics. Recently, a community member brought a concern to UIO staff about racist comments and cultural insensitivity they experienced at a clinic they were referred to.

The UIO leadership is looking for ways to ensure they are referring community members to clinics that will treat them with respect. They want to build strong relationships with trusted medical providers and improve the cultural responsiveness of the care their community members receive.



Case Study 2:

UIO B is a Limited Ambulatory clinic that provides HIV testing. Clinic staff have recently been attending local health fairs and community events to offer mobile HIV testing, but have encountered very little interest from community members.

The clinic staff are seeking to increase the number of HIV tests they administer, both in clinic and at community events. They are also looking to better understand why there is little interest in the tests they are offering.



Case Study 3:

UIO C is a Full Ambulatory clinic that provides comprehensive HIV services, including testing, treatment, and prevention counseling alongside traditional healing. UIO leadership would like to continue improving the availability and accessibility of their services, but the lack of Indigenous health data available regarding the HIV syndemic has made it difficult to fill their knowledge gaps.

UIO C's leaders would like to increase the amount and quality of culturally responsive data that informs their HIV service provision. Program evaluation and reporting measures that are culturally grounded are of particular interest to them.






