## 2019 YEAR IN REVIEW

The National Council of Urban Indian Health (NCUIH) is the national organization representing 41 Title V Urban Indian Organizations (UIOs) funded by the Indian Health Service. NCUIH is devoted to the support and development of quality, accessible, and culturally-competent health services for American Indians and Alaska Natives (AI/ANs) living in urban settings.

As a result of NCUIH's advocacy efforts, the House of Representatives passed a bipartisan funding bill with an increase of over **\$30 million** for Urban Indian Health. The Senate proposed the highest amount ever recommended for UIOs at \$53 million, setting a high water mark for future funding. The bills await further action.
